

DID YOU KNOW?

Our Mother of Perpetual Help - The Symbolism of the Icon

In the Eastern world, religious art is seen as an extension of God's presence in creation. Icons are much more than beautiful images: they're meant to help us connect directly with God.

The artist who writes the icon strives to illuminate the viewer's soul with divine truth. Above is a photo of the icon of Our Lady of Perpetual Help—the most widely known icon in the world. This sacred image has special importance for the Redemptorists, who were asked by Pope Pius IX to "make her known throughout the world."

Each element of the icon has a specific meaning:

- Mary's eyes, filled with compassion and love, are directed toward us.
- Our Lady is clothed in the colors of virgins (red) and of mothers (blue). These are also royal colors.
- Jesus, depicted as a young boy, wears the colors of a king.
- The star on Mary's veil reminds us that she is the dawn announcing the coming of Christ.
- Our Lady's hands hold her Son securely, and her right hand directs our gaze to Him.
- The Christ Child grasps his mother's hand as though he is frightened by what he sees.
- In His hurry to reach his mother, Jesus has almost lost one of his sandals. He became human, like us, in all things but sin.
- On Our Lady's left and right we see the reasons for the child's fear. On the right is the Archangel Gabriel, holding a cross and four nails. On the left is the Archangel Michael, holding a lance, a pole with a sponge, and a vessel of vinegar. This vision of the instruments of the crucifixion has driven the young Jesus to his mother's protective embrace.
- Yet Our Lady's gaze is fixed on us, her children on earth. She is our source of constant .



KNOWING OUR CHURCH

Meet our new saints

Last Sunday, October 13, Pope Francis canonized four women alongside St. John Henry Newman. These women, a stigmatist, a mystic, a Roman orphan and Nobel Peace prize nominee, also proclaimed Christ through their lives and their miracles in a unique way.

Mariam Thresia (1876-1926), of India, was the founder of the Congregation of the Holy Family, which educated young girls and took care of orphans, among other apostolates. Known as a mystic and having received the stigmata, her final words were: "Jesus, Mary and Joseph, I give you my heart and my soul."



Giuseppina Vannini (1859-1911), of Italy, was the foundress of The Daughters of St. Camillus, who are dedicated to nursing the sick and elderly. Having studied to be a kindergarten teacher, she discerned that God was ultimately calling her to religious life.



- Irma Dulce Lopes Pontes (1914-1992), of Brazil, served Brazil's poor and sick. She founded the Sao Francisco's Worker's Union and the Charitable Works Foundation of Sister Dulce (Obras Sociais Irma Dulce). She was nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize by President José Sarney of Brazil.
- Marguerite Bays (1815-1879) was a Swiss consecrated virgin of the Third Order of St. Francis. She was dedicated to addressing the needs of the sick and dying, children and the poor. After being miraculously healed of cancer in 1854, she

began to relive physically and spiritually the events of Christ's passion and received the stigmata. She had a strong love for Mary and for praying the Rosary; she spent many hours in Eucharistic adoration.

QUESTIONS OF THE WEEK

Question for Children: Jesus teaches us to trust God. How does God help you in your daily life?

Question for Youth: Jesus tells us that persistence will pay off, if we continue to pray to God. How and when do you pray? How could you grow in the ways that you pray?

Question for Adults: When you pray, what do you ask for most often? How do you know God gives you this request?



Faithful Stewardship

"...proclaim the word, be persistent whether it is convenient or inconvenient..." 2 *TIMOTHY* 4:2

It is not always convenient to be a good *Steward*, especially when all the temptations of our busy and materialistic world get in the way. Now add our own pride and ego into the equation and living a stewardship lifestyle may be downright uncomfortable! Remember, God didn't call us to be comfortable. He called us to be faithful.

STEWARDHIP SAINT

St. John Paul II Feast Day: October 22



Man of Prayer and Sacrifice Karol J. Wojtyla's own life is the best evidence for the truth of his famous maxim. Born on May 18, 1920, in Wadowice, Poland he survived the Nazi occupation, secretly studying for the priesthood at an underground seminary by night while toiling in a rock quarry by day, and later saw his country brought under the yoke of the Soviet Union. This double brush with

totalitarianism left a deep mark on the man who would become Pope John Paul II – yet it never broke his spirit. He remained a charismatic figure with a deep love of arts and culture – a true man of the people.

Faithful Bishop

As bishop, Wojtyla contributed greatly to the Second Vatican Council, equipping the Church to preach the unchanging Gospel of Jesus Christ to a rapidly evolving modern world.

Holy Pope

Elected to the Throne of Peter in 1978, Pope John Paul II traveled the world, visiting more than 100 countries, receiving record numbers of pilgrims, and making a special effort to connect with the world's youth.

Throughout his papacy, John Paul II held up Christ crucified as the answer to the false ideologies of left, right, and center, not sparing the excesses of capitalism or the materialism of the West. He also thundered against the "culture of death," and steered his brother bishops to a proper understanding of Vatican II.

Suffering Servant

Struck down by four bullets in St. Peter's Square on May 13, 1981, the feast of Our Lady of Fatima, Saint John Paul II transformed his suffering into grace by offering it up for the whole Church and eventually even forgiving the man who pulled the trigger.

At the end of his life, Saint John Paul II bravely faced the ravages of Parkinson's disease and, in imitation of the God he loved, once again offered up his own sufferings in union with those of Christ for the whole Church.

Interceding Saint

John Paul II's love for the Church did not end in death. A dying French nun, Sister Marie Simon-Pierre, prayed to the holy pope during her battle with Parkinson's disease and was miraculously cured. A second miracle occurred when a 50-yearold Costa Rican woman was cured of a brain aneurysm after praying at a home-made shrine to the holy pope. Once these events were confirmed beyond doubt by the Church in 2014, Pope John Paul II was proclaimed a saint.
