How Do We Change Our Culture of Death?

P ope John Paul II noted that the structure of man's sin is characterized or manifest on a universal scale in our Culture of Death. He pointed out that the powerful are easily able to manhandle the weak (e.g. abortion and euthanasia).

The culture of death is not the result of philosophy or decrepit ethics, or political theory.

The culture of death is a result of sin committed freely by persons.

Thus it is fundamentally a personal problem, not a political one. So, the battle will not be won solely by a political action or movement, because the battle is not against human beings or arid philosophies, but is a



battle against sin: "For our struggle is not with flesh and blood but with the principalities, with the powers, with the world rulers of this present darkness, with the evil spirits in the heavens" (Eph. 6:12).

Therefore, first and foremost, we must first recognize God's saving action and saving mission, and then participate in it. This has always been, and will always be the Church's role. We love because He loved us first (1 Jn. 4:19), and we spread that love through our testimony to the nations (Acts 1:8).

We must try to influence our culture with our words and deeds, realizing that the purpose of evangelization is always to introduce man to the Person of Christ, and the Person of Christ to man, that man might enter into His mystical body, the Church.

Thus, through grace attained by turning to Him, the culture of death can indeed be transformed, simply because the Gospel always has the power to transform the hearts of men...even when the culture seems most evil, hopeless and perverse.

Why Pray the Rosary

Many great popes, saints, and Christian leaders have exhorted us to pray the rosary. It's a powerful prayer, they say, one that can change your life, strengthen the family, bring peace to the world, convert entire nations, and win the salvation of souls.

But does the average person experience the rosary this way?

Many Catholics, unfortunately, have the impression that the rosary is not relevant for them. It might be a sacred prayer for very religious people—priests, religious sisters, and exceptional Catholics—but not for "an ordinary lay person like me." Even some devout Catholics admit that they are a bit intimidated by this prayer. They have tremendous respect for the rosary, know it's important, but feel bad that they don't love it more. Many view it as the marathon of Catholic devotions. "I know it's an important prayer, but it takes fifteen to twenty minutes. I'm too busy. I don't have time for that." "It's too hard to stay focused for that much time. I prefer shorter prayers."

Some have questions about the rosary: Does all this attention to Mary distract us from a relationship with God? Why do we repeat the same prayers over and over? Are we supposed to concentrate on the prayers, the mysteries, or both? Still others think the rosary is just plain boring—a monotonous, dry, mechanical way of talking to God, not as personal and meaningful as other forms of prayer. "It's like taking the garbage out for your wife. You know you should do it, but date night is more exciting." "Sure, the rosary might be good for you—like flossing your teeth—but it's not as interesting and meaningful to me as spiritual reading or adoration."

Others wonder if all the repetition has any meaning. "I know the rosary is important, but it just seems like rote prayer," one young adult said. "It's like saying magical words and something good is supposed to happen. What's the point? Is simply saying these words actually doing anything for me spiritually?"

But what if I were to show you that there is a lot more going on in the rosary than simply saying these words and counting them with beads? What if I were to tell you that the rosary is not beyond you—that you, wherever you may be in your relationship with God, can actually experience a profound, intimate, personal encounter with Jesus through this devotion? And what if you were to discover that there are many different ways to pray the rosary—indeed, some that can easily fit within your schedule and help you with whatever challenges you face right now in your life.

Think of the rosary as being like the ocean: There's something in it for everyone, whether you consider yourself a veteran mystic longing to go deeper in prayer with our Lord, a novice struggling to learn how to pray, or someone seeking the Lord's help, right now, with something going on in your life. The deep-sea explorer and the child making sand castles on the beach can fully enjoy the same ocean while playing at different levels. And this is true with the rosary.

Ministry Spotlight



Knights of Columbus - Arden-Carmichael Council 4970

I n a time when parish and fraternal societies were popular, Father Michael J. McGivney, a parish pastor in New Haven, Connecticut, felt there

should be some way to strengthen the religious faith of his flock and provide financial support for families overwhelmed by illness or the death of the breadwinner. Father McGivney saw these hardships on a daily basis. Having had the same experience as a child, he knew firsthand of the difficulties faced by these families. Left without pensions or means of support, they turned to their parish community for help.

In October 1881, Fr. McGivney and a handful of Catholic laymen, met in the basement of St. Mary's Catholic Church. His aim was to set up a parish-based lay organization to help Catholic men remain steadfast to their faith, and offer protection for Catholic families.

In 1882 Father McGivney responded by bringing together the concerned men of his parish to form a new fellowship of care and protection... The Knights of Columbus. Its primary goal:

To render financial aid to its members and the beneficiaries of its members."

On March 29, 1882, the Connecticut legislature granted a charter to the Knights of Columbus, formally establishing it as a legal corporation.

Since that first council was formed in New Haven, CT,

the Order has grown to include councils in the USA, Canada, Mexico, the Philippines, Puerto Rico, Cuba, the Dominican Republic, the Bahamas, the Virgin Islands, Guatemala, Guam, Saipan, Poland. Ukraine, Lithuania. Our Council, Arden-Carmichael Council 4970 was formed in May 1960. Over the years, we have hosted the parishes of Our Lady of the Assumption, St. Ignatius, St. John the Evangelist, Presentation, St. Philomene and Holy Wisdom parishes. However, as the council membership grew, pastors from all but OLA and SI decided to form a council in their respective parishes. So today, we fully support OLA and SI with over 150 members. Although our council membership has dwindled, the Order itself has grown immensely with over 1.9 million men plus their families.

Today, we have begun a new journey, Faith in Action, with far reaching services branching in all aspects of Catholic life within our parishes as well as our community. We meet twice monthly in St. John Hall here at the parish; our business meeting (second Tuesdays), open to only members but our pre-meeting dinner is open to all. Our planning meeting (fourth Tuesdays) is open to all and at this meeting we get input from many members and non-members as to enhancing our current programs but also new programs to fulfill our Faith in Action commitments.

In 1985 we were also incorporated as a non-profit organization in the State of California as Arden-Carmichael, Inc. Our members and their spouses are direct members of the Corporation without any additional dues or fees. The Corporation funds most of our charitable donations. It meets annually in January.
